This will increase their chances of being allocated housing significantly. LAW: Please note that we are very restricted in accepting late nominations due to serious shortage in housing in The Netherlands (And limited course offerings when applying late).
Admission requirements	A GPA of 3.0 out of 4.0 and at least two years of prior academic study before arrival, unless otherwise agreed in bilateral agreements.	
Language requirements	<p>Please refer to our Erasmus agreement whether a language test is required. If a language test is required, please see below more information:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • IELTS Academic test: at least 6.5 • TOEFL test: 90 (internet-based test) • Cambridge CAE (Certificate of Advanced English): 180 • Cambridge CPE (Certificate of Proficiency in English) - Test results should not be older than two years. Institutional TOEFL (ITP) tests are not accepted. A few individual courses may require a higher test score. All courses at LUC require IELTS 7.0 or TOEFL 100 (internet-based). - Please note that we do not accept the TOEFL IBT Special Home Edition™ and TOEFL IBT Paper Based™ for admission. - Current TOEFL scoring will continue to be accepted for the next two years; please contact us if you have questions about the new scoring system. - An English language test result is not required if students have completed their secondary education in Australia, Canada (English-taught programmes), Ireland, New Zealand, the UK or the USA, or if they have an International Baccalaureate diploma. - Programme specific language proficiency requirements for Master programmes can be found on our website. <p><i>Important note:</i> We do not require a language test result from Erasmus students,</p>	

	<p>but all students studying at Leiden University must meet our language requirement as stated on our website. We can accept a statement from your home coordinator stating your English language proficiency. Please note that the English language proficiency requirement for some programmes may be higher than B2 (Master level courses for example have C1 requirement). Make sure to check which requirement applies to you.</p>
Online nomination	<p>Students need to be nominated by their home university coordinator via our online nomination form before they can start their application. Nominations will be processed on a rolling basis from February 1 for Fall and from August 15 for Spring. We kindly request you not to nominate your students outside of the nomination periods mentioned above. Nomination instructions will be shared separately to this document. <u>We kindly request you not to nominate your students outside of the nomination periods mentioned above.</u></p>
Online application and admission	<p>Once their nomination has been approved, students will receive Leiden University account details, (ULCN) and will be invited to submit their application via our online application portal uSis.</p> <p>After completing their personal details and submitting supporting documents, students are prompted to submit course requests in our online application portal.</p> <p>Once an application is complete, if the student meets the admission criteria, course requests are forwarded to the faculties for evaluation. A student must be admitted to several specific courses of min. 15 ECTS before an offer of admission can be extended. We recommend that students not book flights or make other travel plans before receiving their offer of admission. In addition to their desired courses, students should also select max. 3 alternative courses in case their first choices are not all approved.</p> <p>Important note: If your students need more than 15 ECTS, make sure that they apply for more courses.</p>

PRE-DEPARTURE

Website for international students	This website with information on life in the Netherlands and practical matters such as Visa, Housing and Financial Matters will help students prepare their stay.
Housing	<p>Leiden University does not have its own dormitories; instead, students live in accommodation offered by external housing agencies and private landlords throughout Leiden and The Hague. Because housing in the Netherlands is limited and can be expensive, we strongly encourage students to begin their search well in advance and not rely solely on university-arranged options.</p> <p>Each year, the university reserves a limited number of rooms through DUWO for new international students, with priority given to short-term students, such as</p>

	<p>exchange students and one-year master's students. Although housing cannot be guaranteed, students may apply for university housing as soon as they submit their application for admission—there is no need to wait for an admission decision—and are encouraged to pay the €285 housing fee early. Once a room is reserved, DUWO will guide students through the next steps. We also advise all students to explore additional private housing options, and Leiden University is happy to provide guidance and tips during this process. Leiden University can give advice and tips. Please be informed that private housing can be expensive and is scarce.</p>
Visa and residence permits	<p>Holders of EU/EEA passports do not require a residence permit to study at Leiden University. Students with a non-EU nationality must have a residence permit and in many cases an entry visa as well. Once a student has been admitted to Leiden University, the International Relations Office will work with the student to apply on their behalf. Students should note that there is a fee of €243* for visas/permits and strict deadlines for submission of documents. Please note: the amount of living fee a student has to prove is €1150* p/m (for one semester is this amount €5750* and for 2 semesters €11500*). You must demonstrate proof of sufficient funds for living expenses for the duration of your exchange programme.</p>
Insurance	<p>All students are obliged to have health insurance to cover any medical costs incurred during their stay. We strongly recommend that students ensure they have medical insurance before their arrival. Students are also highly recommended to take out liability insurance to cover any accidental damage caused to other persons or property.</p>
Estimated living expenses	<p>On average, students will need at least €968 – €1338 per month. Also see financial matters.</p> <p>Please note that public transport is not free for exchange students, but discount cards are available.</p>

	<p>city life, student life and university life of our Campus in The Hague.</p> <p>The orientation programme fee is €100 for participation in August and €55* for participation in January. *These fees are subject to change.</p> <p>Participation in either OWL or HOP is optional - and great fun!</p>
Residence Life Programme (RLP)	<p>Students living in university provided international accommodation in Leiden area and The Hague can rely on Resident Assistants living in their buildings. The Resident Assistants try to create a home away from home for the new tenants by organizing community building events, lending a sympathetic ear, and helping them with issues or questions they may be experiencing. They also function as a contact point, referring them to the appropriate Student Support Services, and as a liaison between DUWO, and the interests of the tenants.</p>
International Student Associations	<p>Leiden University houses several international student associations who organize cultural and social events for international and internationally-oriented students in Leiden and The Hague; a great way to make friends and get involved!</p>
Dutch language and customs	<p>Language courses are not available as regular exchange programme courses. The University's Academic Language Centre offers Dutch language courses for a fee. Please note that the grades of the language courses cannot be included in the transcript.</p> <p>However, international students can register for the free online Dutch language course Dutch & More, which has been developed for international students.</p> <p>Students who have completed the SPOC successfully and are enrolled at Leiden University are entitled to do the Dutch 1B course at the Academic Language Centre at a reduced rate of €85 instead of €245. For more information on this course, click here.</p>
Student life	<p>Leiden and The Hague are vibrant student cities with a rich student life and plenty of sports and cultural activities.</p>

Academic calendar	The academic year officially runs from September 1 through to August 31. All faculties follow a semester calendar: the first semester lasts from September until December/January. The second semester courses start in February.

Languages of instruction	English and Dutch
Credit and grading	Leiden University uses the ECTS credit transfer system. Most courses carry a load of 5 or 10 ECTS credits. As is common in the Netherlands, the top grades of 9 and 10 are rarely given. A grading table will be provided on all transcript of records. Please check the website for more information on the grading table .
Standard course load	<p>15-30 ECTS per semester for non-degree students. 30 ECTS is the standard full-time semester load for degree students. 1 ECTS credit equals 28 hrs of study, including contact hours and self-study.</p> <p>Important note: To be admitted as an exchange/study abroad students, students must be admitted to at least 15 EC for one semester. However, home universities will usually require that students take more credits than that. We recommend that students make sure they are admitted to a sufficient number of courses to meet their credit requirements before the application deadline!</p>
Course approval & registration	<p>Course approval occurs at the time of application to the exchange program. This process reserves students a place in the approved courses at most programmes.* Registration for approved courses in our online registration system occurs prior to the start of the semester. This process differs per faculty; students will receive further instructions close to the start of the semester.</p> <p>Questions regarding course registration after arrival should be directed to the academic coordinator at the faculty responsible for the course a student wishes to take.</p> <p>*Please refer to our website for detailed information about course selection. About the course restrictions refer to the information under <i>Important faculty-specific considerations</i>.</p>
Examinations	<p>At the Law Faculty all exams of the first semester starting with course code 22989 will be completed before the Christmas break (December) Other courses may have their exams in January. Retakes take place in January.</p> <p>Alternative arrangements for assessments are not possible</p>
Transcript issuance	<p>Students can download their digitally certified transcript from the uSis application portal up to 60 days after the end of their final semester at Leiden University. After this period, transcripts can be requested via email at incomingexchange@law.leidenuniv.nl.</p> <p>Transcripts are typically finalized by:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Fall students: mid-February to mid-March• Spring and Full-Year students: mid-June to late August <p>These are estimated timeframes, and exact dates cannot be guaranteed. Transcripts are not automatically sent to partner institutions. If you require them to be sent directly, contact incomingexchange@law.leidenuniv.nl .
